Tapestry of cultures in diocese united in worship at special liturgy

METUCHEN — The diocese celebrated the feast of Pentecost with a multicultural Mass at the Cathedral of Saint Francis of Assisi. Reminiscent of the first Pentecost, the Mass was celebrated and spoken in many tongues but all present heard and understood in their own language.

Msgr. Joseph J. Kerrigan, who served as principal celebrant and homilist, welcomed in six languages the worshipers who filled the pews..

"We can never ever have a generic Pentecost," he said. "The nature of the feast today is about newness and freshness of life. There is nothing stale about Pentecost and the presence of God in our lives. The Holy Spirit is new, fresh and alive or nothing at all."

In his homily Msgr. Kerrigan noted, "This great feast of Pentecost is a day to be fearless with our faith, to welcome the God of surprises, to welcome the Spirit of newness, to give thanks for these great gifts of diversity that we can see here today. That what I lack someone else completes and what I have may help someone else."

Priests, deacons, lectors and altar

servers were of a variety of ethnic backgrounds and the faithful included people of many nations. Many were dressed in clothes from their native homeland. The plethora of cultures and color created a beautiful tapestry, with readings and the prayers of the faithful spoken in languages such as Korean, Indonesian, Swahili, Tamil, Konkani, Gujarati,






